## **PROCEEDINGS**

First Vice Chair Bruce Scott called the meeting of the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (KIA) Board to order.

Mr. Scott asked DLG Staff Attorney Bill Pauley to confirm the press notification and the presence of a quorum. Guests were asked to introduce themselves.

### I. <u>BUSINESS (Board Action Required)</u>

### A. 1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

For: KIA Regular Board Meeting of October 5, 2017

Mr. Claude Christensen moved to approve the minutes of the October 5, 2017, regular board meeting. Mr. Ron Lovan seconded, and the motion carried unanimously.

#### **B. NEW PROJECTS/ACTION ITEMS**

1. A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR A FEDERALLY ASSISTED CLEAN WATER REVOLVING FUND A LOAN (A18-026) FOR AN AMOUNT UP TO \$5,619,274 TO THE REGIONAL WATER RESOURCE AGENCY, DAVIESS COUNTY, KENTUCKY

Mr. Jory Becker, DOW, and Ms. Ashley Adams, KIA, addressed the group to present information on The Regional Water Resource Agency (RWRA) request for a Fund A loan in the amount of \$5,619,274 for the Hawes Treatment Plant and Ragu Pump Station Upgrades project.

The project proposes to upgrade and rehabilitate the David W. Hawes Wastewater Treatment Plant (DHP) and potentially upgrade the Ragu Pump Station and force main that flows into the DHP. The upgrades are needed to accommodate increasing flows that have resulted from the redirection of wastewater flows away from the CSS and continued abandonment of failing septic systems and package treatment plant systems in the sewer-shed.

The treatment plant upgrades include the installation of UV disinfection systems at the plant that will replace the existing chlorination and dechlorination systems to more effectively eliminate bacteria in an environmentally conscious method as the average daily flow increases in the plant. The UV method treatment will also eliminate disinfection byproducts discharged from the chlorination and dechlorination systems.

Also, the electrical and control infrastructure will be upgraded to support the new UV system and headworks expansion and will include the redistribution of treatment facility electrical loading as well as the replacement of faulty and exposed power feeds throughout the treatment facility.

This project will rehabilitate the headworks by constructing a new influent structure and rerouting the influent piping to better handle flow and allow for flow metering. Two new bar screens will also be installed between the new influent structure and the oxidation ditch to increase the current flow capacity at the plant's headworks. Finally, this project will include the evaluation and reconfiguration of the existing backup generator since the current configurations are inadequate to support the plant during an emergency.

After the completion of the treatment plant upgrades, the Ragu Pump Station and force man will be evaluated to determine if additional modifications are needed to support the increasing flow into the treatment plant. These modifications could potentially include the reconfiguration of the wet well and increasing the force main size from a 12 inch to a 16 inch line between the treatment plant and Ragu Pump Station.

Ms. Linda Bridwell moved to approve the Fund "A" Loan (A18-026) up to the amount of \$5,619,274 to the Regional Water Resource Agency with the standard conditions. Mr. Paul Lashbrooke seconded and the motion was unanimously approved.

2. A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR AN INFRASTRUCTURE REVOLVING FUND LOAN (B18-007) FOR AN AMOUNT UP TO \$250,000 TO THE CITY OF LEWISBURG, LOGAN COUNTY, KENTUCKY

Ms. Meili Sun, KIA, discussed the City of Lewisburg's request for a Fund B loan in the amount of \$250,000 for a planning and design loan for the Sewer System Upgrade project. In the planning phase, a sanitary sewer evaluation survey (SSES) will be undertaken to provide an understanding of the existing assets and the deficiencies in the system. This work may include smoke testing, video inspection of sewer lines, flowing monitoring, physical inspection of manholes and lift stations, as well as an assessment of the wastewater treatment plant. The facilities plan for the system will include an assessment as it exists today, a determination of what may be needed to bring it up to a condition that will reliably serve the community for the foreseeable future, and a consideration of the various alternatives to achieve the desired results. Repairs to the collection system are expected to include line replacement, in-place rehabilitation of sewers by trenchless techniques, repair or replacement of manholes, and point repairs.

In the summer of 2017, the Lewisburg municipal wastewater collection and treatment system experienced very high inflow rates resulting in collection system overflows and overloading of the wastewater treatment plant. These high flow

events caused permit violations for which the city was cited by the Division of Enforcement.

Lewisburg expects to be placed under an agreed order in the near future and the actions above will result in achieving compliance with its discharge permits.

Ms. Linda Bridwell moved to approve the Fund "B" Loan, (B18-007) up to the amount of \$250,000 to the City of Lewisburg with the standard conditions. Mr. Ron Lovan seconded and the motion was unanimously approved

3. A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR A FEDERALLY ASSISTED DRINKING WATER REVOLVING FUND LOAN (F18-004) FOR AN AMOUNT UP TO \$1,297,200 TO THE CITY OF MOREHEAD F/B/O MOREHEAD UTILITY PLANT BOARD, ROWAN COUNTY, KENTUCKY

Ms. Ashley Adams, KIA, discussed the City of Morehead for the benefit of Morehead Utility Plant Board's request for a Fund F loan, (F18-004), in the amount of \$1,297,200. This project will provide funding for the planning and design of a new 12 million gallons per day (MGD) regional water treatment plant (WTP) to replace the existing 8 MGD plant. The original WTP was constructed in 1968 and requires continuous maintenance in order to adequately serve nearly 3,500 customers in the area as well as two wholesale customers (Bath County Water District and Rowan Water Inc.). Many of the plant's components are original to the facility while some were replaced in a 1980s expansion. Due to the age of the equipment, many of the required repairs require retrofitting or custom-made replacement parts which result in constant repair delays as well as increased maintenance costs. These issues result in potential interruption of water service to customers.

The new 12 MGD plant will feature new and improved technologies that were introduced to the treatment process back in the last major expansion of the existing plant (2002). The plant will employ Actiflo treatment technology with gravity filtration.

The new plant will include all new treatment and administration facilities on a site near the existing WTP, upgrade SCADA for the WTP and distribution system sites, and increase the clearwell capacity to 1.5m gallons (currently 1.237m gallons). Along with this, the project will construct a new raw water intake and components affiliated with the structure on Cave Run Lake (about three miles away from the current intake location). The project will also construct a new 700,000 gallon ground storage tank (the existing 621,000 gallon tank will be decommissioned).

The future construction portion of this project is intended to be funded through a multiphased loan agreement with KIA (the utility will also attempt to seek out grant funds).

The utility has outlined a budget spanning from FY 2018-2023 with their expected funding needs each year to accommodate the anticipated disbursements needed from KIA. Total project cost is currently estimated to be \$28,428,000.

Ms. Linda Bridwell moved to approve the Fund "F" Loan, (F18-004) in the amount of \$1,297,200 to the City of Morehead F/B/O of Morehead Utility Plant Board with the standard conditions. Mr. David Voegele seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved.

4. A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A COMMITMENT FOR AN INFRASTRUCTURE REVOLVING FUND LOAN (C18-002) IN THE AMOUNT OF \$800,281 TO THE CARROLL COUNTY WATER DISTRICT #1, CARROLL COUNTY, KENTUCKY

Mr. Jeff Abshire discussed the refinance of loan F03-02. The original loan was approved at a 3% interest rate on November 20, 2003 for construction of water lines in the Bucks Run/Bethel Church area connecting to the Tri Village Water District and from the existing line along Route 42 to pick up a mobile home park located along Route 42 and the Ohio River. The interest rate will be reduced to 2.25% resulting in a savings of approximately \$24,000 over the life of the new loan.

Ms. Gwen Pinson and Ms. Linda Bridwell abstained from voting, Mr. Paul Lashbrooke moved to approve the refinance of an F Loan (F03-02) to a Fund C Loan (C18-002) to The Carroll County Water District #1 in the amount of \$800,281 with the standard conditions. Mr. Mark Bunning seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved.

5. A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A COMMITMENT FOR AN INFRASTRUCTURE REVOLVING FUND LOAN (C18-003) IN THE AMOUNT OF \$988,979 TO THE CITY OF BOWLING GREEN F/B/O BOWLING GREEN MUNICIPAL UTILITIES, WARREN COUNTY, KENTUCKY

Mr. Jeff Abshire discussed the refinance of loan F00-01 which was approved with a 3.8% interest rate on April 4, 2000. The original project involved a water treatment plant renovation, upgrade, and water transmission system improvements. By moving the loan to Fund C, the interest rate will be reduced to 2% based on the remaining 5 year loan term. This will save the Utility approximately \$51,000.

Mr. Claude Christiansen moved to approve the refinance of a Fund F Loan (F00-01) to a Fund C Loan (C18-003) to the City of Bowling Green F/B/O Bowling Green Municipal Utilities in the amount of \$988,979 with the standard conditions. Ms. Linda Bridwell seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved.

6. A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR AN INFRASTRUCTURE REVOLVING FUND LOAN (C18-004) IN THE AMOUNT OF \$2,284,113 TO THE CITY OF BOWLING GREEN F/B/O BOWLING GREEN MUNICIPAL UTILITIES, WARREN COUNTY, KENTUCKY

Mr. Jeff Abshire, discussed the refinance of loan F02-08 which was approved with a 3% interest rate on September 24, 2002. The original project involved the expansion of the water treatment plant from a capacity of 22.5 MGD to 30 MGD. There were also various other system improvements to the raw water intake, flocculation/sedimentation basin, chemical feed, filters, piping, and electrical system. By moving the loan to Fund C, the interest rate will be reduced to 2.25% based on the remaining 10 year loan term. This will save the Utility approximately \$97,000.

Mr. Claude Christensen moved to approve the refinance of a Fund F Loan (F02-08) to a Fund C Loan (C18-004) to the City of Bowling Green F/B/O Bowling Green Municipal Utilities in the amount of \$2,284,113 with the standard conditions. Mr. Ron Lovan seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved.

7. A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A COMMITMENT FOR AN INFRASTRUCTURE REVOLVING FUND LOAN (C18-005) IN THE AMOUNT OF \$738,605 TO THE CITY OF EDDYVILLE, LYON COUNTY, KENTUCKY

Mr. Jeff Abshire discussed the refinance of loan F03-04. The original loan was approved at a 3% interest rate on November 6, 2003 for construction of a new raw water intake on Lake Barkley and a 500,000 gallon water storage tank. The interest rate will be reduced to 2.25% resulting in a savings of approximately \$25,000 over the life of the new loan.

Ms. Linda Bridwell moved to approve the refinance of a Fund F Loan (F03-04) to a Fund C Loan (C18-005) in the amount of \$739,605 to the City of Eddyville with the standard conditions. Ms. Gwen Pinson seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved.

8. A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A COMMITMENT FOR AN INFRASTRUCTURE REVOLVING FUND LOAN (C18-006) IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,784,102 TO THE CITY OF ASHLAND, BOYD COUNTY, KENTUCKY

Mr. Jeff Abshire discussed the refinance of loan F03-01. The original loan was approved at a 3% interest rate on June 5, 2003 for upgrades and improvements of the raw water pump station, the coagulation/flocculation system with the addition of Actiflo equipment, the filtration system, and the high service pump station. The

interest rate will be reduced to 2.25% resulting in a savings of approximately \$60,500 over the life of the new loan.

Mr. Ron Lovan moved to approve the refinance of a Fund F Loan (F03-01) to a Fund C Loan (C18-006) in the amount of \$1,784,102 to the City of Ashland with the standard conditions. Ms. Linda Bridwell seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved.

Mr. Claude Christensen moved to approve the preliminary bond resolution authorizing the sale of the bonds. Mr. Ron Lovan seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

10. ## 11. CONSIDERATION OF THE FISCAL YEAR END JUNE 30, 2017 KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUDIT REPORT

Mr. Allen Norvell, Blue & Co., LLC and Mr. Jeff Abshire discussed the fiscal year audit for the year ending June 30, 2017. All Board members received a copy of the audit prior to the meeting for their review. Mr. Norvell stated that it was a clean audit, there were no difficulties in working with management to complete the audit. There were no disagreements with management during the course of the audit. There was one finding that was noted "a significant deficiency in internal control over compliance." Deadlines were not met for Federal Reporting. As of the close of fiscal year 2017, the Authority reported an ending net position of \$1,101,008,000, an increase of \$33,393,000 (3.1%) in comparison with the prior year.

Noted financial highlights were: The Authority's total liabilities decreased \$22,451,000 (7.5%) during fiscal year 2017; the Authority disbursed \$146,477,000 to borrowers for eligible expenditures under loan assistance agreements and \$6,414,000 to local governmental entities for state grants; and principal and interest in the amount of \$63,369,000 was collected from borrowers for assistance agreements.

Mr. Mark Bunning moved to approve the audit for year ending June 30, 2017. Ms. Linda Bridwell seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved.

### 12. BYLAWS REVISIONS

Director McNeil and Staff Attorney Bill Pauley discussed changes that were being made to the current KIA Bylaws. One change that is being made will be changing the required meeting to the first Thursday of each month. Due to some conflicts that is not always possible. Moving forward, the Board will establish a meeting schedule for the upcoming calendar year at their December meeting. Another revision will be the Election of Officers. This will also be done at the December Board meeting.

Mr. Ron Lovan moved to approve the suggested Bylaw revisions. Mr. Robert Amato seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved.

Section 2. The Authority hereby authorizes the issuance of a conditional Federally Assisted Clean Water Revolving Fund A loan for an amount up to \$3,066,988 of project expense including capitalized interest for the construction period, to the Marshall County

Fiscal Court for the Draffenville Sewer Expansion Phases 1-3 project. Such amounts are subject to adjustment by further action of the Authority or may be adjusted by action of the Executive Director at the time of the issuance of bonds based on adjustment in project costs of not more than ten percent (10%) of the loan amount authorized by this resolution. Upon satisfaction of all conditions of the commitment, execution of an assistance agreement for this loan is authorized.

From annual revenues, \$7,700 must be set aside in a borrower held replacement reserve each December 1 until the balance reaches \$154,000 and maintained for the life of the loan. These terms are subject to adjustment upon execution of the loan agreement, upon changes in the project conditions or determination that the project will require authority financing to be done on a taxable basis.

## IX. FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Financial information was obtained from the audited financial statements for the Marshall County Fiscal Court General Fund for the years ended June 30, 2014, June 30, 2015, and draft 2016 financials. Cash flow for this credit analysis is presented as a sources and uses flow which includes debt incurrence and capital expenditure transactions. Percentage references in the History section below are based on whole dollar amounts and not the rounded amounts presented.

#### HISTORY

Primary income sources increased 5% from \$5.4 million in 2014 to \$5.6 million in 2016. Taxes make up approximately 46% of the General Fund total revenues and have increased around 4% from 2014-2016. Intergovernmental funds make up approximately 15% of total revenues and have increased 57% during the same time period. Expenses have increased 7.5% from \$7.6 million in 2014 to \$8.2 million in 2016 with the majority of the increase occurring in disbursements for general government expenses. Net operating income was negative from 2014-2016, however, the operating loss was offset each year by a transfer in from the Occupational Tax

#### Administrator's Fund.

The Fiscal Court was approved for a Fund B KIA loan in FY 2010 in the amount of \$1,075,000 with \$800,000 in principal forgiveness to fund the construction of two water storage tanks. The balance of the loan (\$275,000) was paid off early as of March 17, 2017.

### **PROJECTIONS**

Projections are based on the following assumptions:

- 1) Primary income sources will remain flat.
- 2) Expenditures will be managed to maintain a net cash flow of zero each year.
- 3) The newly formed Marshall County Sanitation District will provide whatever possible revenue to the Fiscal Court to support debt service. However, transfers from the Occupational Tax Administrator's Fund to the General Fund will continue going forward to support loan debt service.

Based on the pro forma assumptions, the utility shows adequate cash flow to repay the KIA Fund A loan.

### REPLACEMENT RESERVE

The replacement reserve will be 5% (\$154,000 total) of the final amount borrowed (prior to principal forgiveness, if any) to be funded annually (\$7,700 yearly) each December 1 for 20 years and maintained for the life of the loan.

Such amounts are subject to adjustment by further action of the Authority or may be adjusted by action of the Executive Director at the time of the issuance of bonds based on adjustment in project costs of not more than ten percent (10%) of the loan amount authorized by this resolution. Upon satisfaction of all conditions of the commitment, execution of an assistance agreement for this loan is authorized.

<u>Section 3.</u> The loan shall be repayable over 5 years at an interest rate of 2.75%. In addition to debt service, a 0.2% annual administration fee on the unpaid loan balance will be charged. These terms are subject to adjustment upon execution of the loan agreement, upon changes in the project conditions or determination that the project will require authority financing to be done on a taxable basis.

<u>Section 4.</u> This Resolution and Order shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption at a properly held meeting of the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority this 1st day of February, 2018.

The project will include field investigations (smoke testing, closed-circuit TV inspection, manhole inspections), preparation of a Sewer System Evaluation Survey, and evaluation/studies of pump stations, force mains, and the wastewater treatment plant. These activities will result in a Preliminary Engineering Report detailing problems and recommending solutions.

#### IX. FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Financial information was obtained from the audited financial statements for the years ended June 30, 2014 through June 30, 2016. The non-cash impact of GASB 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions, has been removed from operating expense for fiscal year 2015 in the amount of (\$16,162) and fiscal year 2016 in the amount of \$19,920.

Percentage references in the History section below are based on whole dollar amounts and not the rounded amounts presented.

#### HISTORY

From 2014 to 2016, revenues increased approximately 6.1% due to water and sewer rate increases. During the same time frame, operating expenses were flat. Cash available for debt service was \$118,124, \$110,894, and \$160,701 in 2014, 2015, and 2016, respectively. The debt coverage ratio was 2.0, 1.4, and 2.0.

The 2016 Balance Sheet reflects 52.9 days sales in accounts receivable, 2.6 months of operating expenses in unrestricted cash, a current ratio of 2.4, and a debt to equity ratio of 0.4.

#### **PROJECTIONS**

Projections are based on the following assumptions:

- 1) Revenues will increase 6.3% from 2016 to 2017 and 4% from 2017 to 2018 due to water and sewer rate increases.
- 2) Expenses will increase approximately 2% annually due to inflation.
- 3) Although the total scope of the construction project cannot be realized until planning and design is complete, total revenues will need to increase approximately 10%-11% to cover debt service for the full project (estimated total project cost of \$3.9 million).
- 4) Debt service coverage is 1.3 in 2020 when full principal and interest repayments begin.

Based on the pro forma assumptions, the utility shows adequate cash flow to repay the KIA Fund A loan.

#### REPLACEMENT RESERVE

A replacement reserve will not be required for the planning and design loan. If the project is submitted for construction financing, a reserve requirement will be established based on the entire KIA loan amount.

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A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR AN INFRASTRUCTURE REVOLVING FUND LOAN (B18-002) FOR AN AMOUNT UP TO \$53,000 TO THE CITY OF ALBANY, CLINTON COUNTY, KENTUCKY

**WHEREAS**, the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (the "Authority") has been duly created as a body corporate and politic constituting a public corporation and a governmental agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky pursuant to Chapter 224A of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Act, the Authority is duly and legally authorized to make loans to Governmental Agencies for the purpose of providing funds for the construction and acquisition of sanitary sewer facilities, water facilities or other types of infrastructure, and in that regard, to enter into Assistance Agreements with such Governmental Agencies governing the provisions in respect of which such loans are to be made, the amounts thereof and the repayment provisions in respect thereto; and

**WHEREAS**, the Authority anticipates entering into an Assistance Agreement for a loan from the Authority's Infrastructure Revolving Loan Program with the City of Albany, subject to final determination of amount when the factors involving such financing have been determined; and

**WHEREAS**, the Authority intends to utilize money in the Infrastructure Revolving Fund to make the loan to the governmental agency for the aforementioned purposes; and

**WHEREAS**, the Authority wishes to establish terms and conditions on said Infrastructure Revolving Fund loans.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY, ACTING BY AND THROUGH ITS BOARD OF DIRECTORS AS ITS DULY AUTHORIZED AND EMPOWERED GOVERNING BODY, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AND ORDER, AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1.</u> All statements of fact set forth in the preambles to this Resolution and Order are incorporated herein by reference, the same as if set forth verbatim. All such statements of fact are hereby declared to be true and accurate in all material respects.

Section 2. The Authority hereby authorizes the issuance of a conditional Infrastructure Revolving Fund loan commitment for an amount up to \$53,000 of project expense to the City of Albany for the Rowena Marina Water System Extension project. Such amounts are subject to adjustment by further action of the Authority or may be adjusted by action of the Executive Director based on adjustment in project costs of not more than (10%) ten percent of the loan amount authorized by this resolution. Upon satisfaction of all conditions of the commitment, execution of an assistance agreement for this loan is authorized.

Section 3. The loan shall be repayable over 20 years at an annual interest rate of 0.50%. In addition to debt service, a 0.2% annual administration fee on the unpaid, principal balance will be charged. From annual revenues, \$100 must be set aside in a borrower held replacement reserve each December 1 until the balance reaches \$2,000 and maintained for the life of the loan. These terms are subject to adjustment upon execution of the loan agreement, upon changes in the project conditions, or determination that the project will require authority financing to be done on a taxable basis.

<u>Section 4.</u> This Resolution and Order shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption at a properly held meeting of the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority this 1<sup>st</sup> day of February, 2018.

#### **HISTORY**

From 2014 to 2016, revenues decreased approximately 1.7% while operating expenses increased 0.3%. Cash available for debt service was \$342,727, \$397,013, and \$294,124 in 2014, 2015, and 2016, respectively. The debt coverage ratio was 0.8, 0.9, and 0.7.

The 2016 Balance Sheet reflects 81.6 days sales in accounts receivable, 0.3 months of operating expenses in unrestricted cash, a current ratio of 0.9, and a debt to equity ratio of 0.3.

The City receives approximately 25% (\$580,000) of its service revenue from Keystone Foods.

#### **PROJECTIONS**

Projections are based on the following assumptions:

- 1) Water revenue will increase approximately 14.6% in 2018 due to water rate increases and will continue to increase at least 2.5% annually.
- 2) Sewer revenue will increase at least 2.5% annually due to rate increases.
- 3) Expenses will increase approximately 2% annually due to inflation.
- 4) Debt service coverage is 1.6 in 2020 when full principal and interest repayments begin.

Based on the pro forma assumptions, the utility shows adequate cash flow to repay the KIA Fund B loan.

#### REPLACEMENT RESERVE

The replacement reserve will be 5% (\$2,000 total) of the final amount borrowed to be funded annually (\$100 yearly) each December 1 for 20 years and maintained for the life of the loan.

#### VIII. FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Financial information was obtained from the audited financial statements for the years ended June 30, 2014 through June 30, 2016. The non-cash impact of GASB 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions, has been removed from fiscal 2015 and 2016 operating expenses. The City of Flemingsburg Proprietary Fund is comprised of water, sewer, and gas operations, the financial statements of all three operations are consolidated in this analysis.

#### HISTORY

Total combined revenues (water, sewer, gas) declined 8.4% from 2014 to 2016 while total combined operating expenses also declined 4.3% during the same time period. Water and sewer revenues decreased 2.8% from 2014 to 2016 while operating expenses increased 18.0% due to higher costs of contractual services for maintenance and repairs. Gas operation contributed an average of \$220 thousand per year to the proprietary fund during the 3 years. The debt coverage ratio was 18.6, 6.9, and 1.9 for 2014, 2015, and 2016 respectively.

The balance sheet reflects a current ratio of 17.1, a debt to equity ratio of 0.8, 38.3 days of sales in accounts receivable, and 15.1 months of operating expenses in unrestricted cash.

#### **PROJECTIONS**

Projections are based on the following assumptions:

- 1) Revenues will go up approximately 2% annually due to rate adjustments based on the CPI clause.
- 2) Operating expenses will increase each year by 2% for inflation.

Phase 1 consists of an emergency project to address a failing package treatment plant and pump station that served the Department of Parks Campground, marina, and Premier AKA Edgewater Development. In the summer of 2016, a pump station failure resulted in a possible breach of flow into Taylorsville Lake. Immediate action was taken to temporarily repair the failing Pump Station #1 and bypass the Premier AKA Edgewater Package Treatment Plant, connecting to the City of Taylorsville collection system. This phase has been fully constructed.

Phase II consists of a complete rebuild of Pump Station #1 that is responsible for pumping flow to the City of Taylorsville for treatment as well as the demolition of the package treatment plant and the abandoned pump stations #2 and #3. This phase bid in December 2017 and is scheduled for construction in February.

The City of Taylorsville is currently the legal receiver responsible for the overall operations of the package sewage facility. The City and Parks have agreed that Parks will retain ownership of the project through the life of the loan. Once the loan is paid off by Parks, the infrastructure will be conveyed to the City and the City will continue to have full authority regarding the operation and maintenance of the system.

#### VI. RATE STRUCTURE

Taylorsville Lake State Park does not provide sewer service and therefore does not charge sewer service charge rates.

### VII. <u>DEMOGRAPHICS</u>

Taylorsville Lake State Park, located west of Lexington and southeast of Louisville in Spencer County, is owned by the Commonwealth of Kentucky. It sits on the 3,050-acre Taylorsville Lake and encompasses some of the most beautiful riding country in Kentucky.

Based on current Census data from the American Community Survey 5-Year Estimate 2012-2016, the Utility's service area population was 1,542 with a Median Household Income (MHI) of \$44,772. The median household income for the Commonwealth is \$43,740. The project will qualify for a 1.75% interest rate as the City of Taylorsville is currently in the process of entering into an Agreed Order with the Department of Environmental Protection to resolve the ongoing violations of terms and conditions of the KPDES permit.

## VIII. FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Financial information for the project was obtained from the Fiscal Year 2016-2018 Budget of the Commonwealth. The Department of Parks included \$1.0, \$1.4 and \$1.9 million in operating expenditures for debt service for fiscal year 2016, 17, and 18 respectively.

The Department of Parks administers and operates the Kentucky State Park System under the authority of KRS Chapter 148. The Department strives to provide quality recreational facilities and to preserve and protect historically significant sites and natural phenomena in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The operations include 52 parks and historic sites and one interstate park with facilities for meetings and conference rooms, fine accommodations, camping, golfing, and education along with other park amenities and activities.

#### **PRO FORMA**

The Budget of the Commonwealth for the 2016-2018 biennium is the financial plan for Kentucky State Government as enacted by the Regular Session of the 2016 General Assembly. The risk posed by this budget process is that the Commonwealth cannot obligate itself beyond the biennium, creating an appropriation based credit risk. According to Moody's Investors Service, a credit rating agency, as of July 20, 2017, Kentucky's credit strengths are a stable economy and a demonstration of willingness to cut expenditures to balance the budget. Its credit challenges are large unfunded pension liabilities and high fixed costs. The stable outlook reflects economic stability and a manageable structural imbalance. The entire rating can be found at the end of this credit analysis.

The pro forma is based on the following assumptions:

- 1) The Commonwealth of Kentucky will continue to appropriate funding for debt service for the Department of Parks.
- 2) Payment of principal, interest and administrative fees begins on June 1, 2019.

3) A replacement reserve account will not be required for this loan. Maintenance will be provided for by the City of Taylorsville as agreed upon in a Memorandum of Agreement between the City and Parks.

Based on the aforementioned assumptions, the Commonwealth of Kentucky through its Department of Parks shows adequate cash flow to repay the KIA Fund B loan.

Update - Moody's downgrades Kentucky to Aa3; outlook stable


## **Summary Rating Rationale**

Moody's Investors Service has downgraded the Commonwealth of Kentucky's issuer rating to Aa3 from Aa2. Concurrently, we downgraded Kentucky's general fund appropriation lease-revenue bonds to A1 from Aa3, Kentucky's agency fund appropriation lease-revenue bonds to A2 from A1, the Kentucky Public University Intercept Program programmatic rating to A1 from Aa3 and the Kentucky School District Enhancement Program programmatic rating to A1 from Aa3. See the 'Legal Security' section below for more details. The stable outlooks reflects that of the commonwealth.

This rating action was taken in conjunction with our assignment of a Aa3 to the Kentucky Turnpike Authority's Economic Development Road Revenue and Revenue Refunding Bonds Series 2017 and the downgrade of all of the Authority's and State Property and Building Commission's road revenue bonds to Aa3 from Aa2 (please see separate report published today).

The downgrade reflects revenue underperformance that will challenge the commonwealth's ability to increase its very low pension funding levels. The commonwealth has one of the heaviest unfunded pension burden of all states. The commonwealth high fixed costs will also restrict fiscal flexibility.

#### **Recent Developments**

On July 14, the governor signed an order that addressed a \$152 million, or 1.4% of total revenues, fiscal 2017 shortfall. The order transferred \$83 million in restricted and lapsed funds and reduced appropriations by \$59 million.

#### **Economy**


Kentucky's economy is stable.

Total nonfarm employment increased 28,900, or 1.4% in the twelve months ending May 2017. This was close to the 50-state growth rate of 1.6%.

As has been the case in recent years, most of the growth, 23,200 jobs, was in the service industry. Manufacturing, however, bucked overall softness in the national auto sector and added 4,700 jobs. As a Medicaid expansion state, healthcare is an important contributor to economic growth and stability in Kentucky. The healthcare sector added 6,200 jobs.

Kentucky's low wealth levels will challenge the commonwealth to raise revenues going forward.

#### **Finances and Liquidity**

After growing a healthy 5.3% in fiscal 2015, revenue growth declined to 3.7% in fiscal 2016 and 1.3% in fiscal 2017.

Growth in individual income taxes (42% of total general fund revenues) was offset by weakness in corporate income tax and coal severance taxes. Sales taxes (one third of total general fund revenues) were flat. General fund revenues were 1.3% below what was budgeted for the year.


Road fund revenues increased 1.7% to \$1.5 billion in fiscal 2017 and were 3.5% above the official estimate.

Kentucky has greater exposure to a potential decrease in federal support of Medicaid spending than most other states. Medicaid funding is 30% of all funds appropriations in the current 2016-2018 biennium, the commonwealth's largest single spending category. Kentucky is a Medicaid expansion state and has below-average income levels and thus has a high reliance on federal matching funds.

The current 2017-2018 biennial budget uses just \$415 million, or 2%, in one-time revenues, which is close to structural balance. This does not include the shortfall in pension funding. The budget makes large (9%) cuts to most state agencies and cut higher education funding 4.5%. Onetime items included a \$57 million draw from the rainy day fund.

The commonwealth has made contributions the past few years to its rainy day fund. The Budget Reserve Trust Fund balance stood at \$209.4 million, or 2% of revenues, as of June 30, 2016. Total available fund balance improved to 3% in fiscal 2016 from 1% in fiscal 2015 and negative 1% in fiscal 2014.

#### LIQUIDITY

The commonwealth had an ample \$4 billion of available liquid resources as of June. The balance has been relatively stable around that level for the past four years.

The internal cash and investment pool is available to the general fund to meet short-term liquidity needs.

The general fund of the commonwealth had \$319 million in unassigned fund balance at the end of fiscal 2016. As of June, the general fund had cash of \$239 million on an unaudited basis.

#### **Debt and Pensions**

#### **DEBT STRUCTURE**

Kentucky's long-term liabilities are large. The commonwealth's \$9 billion of net tax supported debt is 4.7% of state GDP, which ranks 6th-highest among states and is more than double the 50-state median of 2.2%, as of 2016.

The commonwealth debt service was 7.4% of revenue in fiscal 2016, which ranked 7th-highest and was well above the 50-state median of 4.1%.

Kentucky's fixed costs are over three times the 50-state median.

#### **DEBT-RELATED DERIVATIVES**

The Commonwealth of Kentucky has a small amount of debt-related derivatives. Swaps outstanding on a notional amount of \$185 million had a market value of negative \$20 million as of June 30, 2017.

#### PENSIONS AND OPEB

Kentucky's Moody's-adjusted net pension liability of \$37 billion as of fiscal 2016 was 265% of revenues, which was 4th-highest among states.

Kentucky's pension liabilities are among the highest of all states. The commonwealth's ability to stop the decline in pension funding levels will be crucial to its credit profile. Historically underfunded, Kentucky took sizeable steps to increasing funding levels in the current biennium. The commonwealth increased funding almost to the actuarially determined amount in the current budget.

Pension contributions remain below the level required to remain stable from one year to the next. However, we believe the gap between current contributions and what the commonwealth would need to maintain current funding levels is manageable.

The commonwealth paid \$413 million for other post-employment benefits (OPEB) in fiscal 2016, adding to high fixed costs.

#### Governance

The commonwealth adheres to binding consensus revenue estimates supported by nonpartisan and objective economic analysis every biennial budget period. In the event of a mid-year gap resulting from a revenue shortfall, the governor has executive authority to cut

expenses without legislative approval. The commonwealth also conducts a debt affordability analysis and performs timely financial reporting. While the commonwealth struggled with timely budget adoption in the past, budgets over the last decade have been timely. There are no constitutional caps on revenue raising or spending increases and the commonwealth is not subject to mandated initiatives or voter referenda. In legislative sessions in the off-year, when no biennial budget is enacted, there is a super-majority requirement for tax increases or legislatively enacted budget adjustments.

## **Legal Security**

The legal security for Kentucky's lease-revenue bonds is a state appropriation of rental payments either out of the general fund or agency funds. The downgrade of the lease-revenue bonds reflects their subject-to-appropriation nature, as well as relatively strong legal structure and essentiality.

The downgrade of the state aid intercept programmatic ratings reflects the one-notch differential between them and that of the commonwealth. The one-notch differential reflects generally average to strong state commitment, program history and program mechanics.

## **Obligor Profile**

The Commonwealth of Kentucky has a population of 4.4 million people and a gross state product of \$195 billion. It has a large and diverse economy, but relatively low wealth levels.

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A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR A FEDERALLY ASSISTED DRINKING WATER REVOLVING FUND LOAN (F18-005) FOR AN AMOUNT UP TO \$1,842,071 TO THE GREEN-TAYLOR WATER DISTRICT, TAYLOR COUNTY, KENTUCKY

**WHEREAS**, the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (the "Authority") has been duly created as a body corporate and politic constituting a public corporation and a governmental agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky pursuant to Chapter 224A of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Act, the Authority is duly and legally authorized to make loans to Governmental Agencies for the purpose of providing funds for the construction and acquisition of sanitary sewer facilities, water facilities or other types of infrastructure, and in that regard, to enter into Assistance Agreements with such Governmental Agencies governing the provisions in respect of which such loans are to be made, the amounts thereof and the repayment provisions in respect thereto; and

**WHEREAS**, the Authority anticipates entering into an Assistance Agreement for a loan from the Authority's Federally Assisted Drinking Water Revolving Loan Program (Fund F) with the Green-Taylor Water District, subject to final determination of amount when the factors involving such financing have been determined; and

**WHEREAS**, the Authority will, in the near future, authorize and issue a series of Infrastructure Authority Revenue Bonds for the purpose of funding loans to various governmental agencies, such series of Bonds to be known as Kentucky Infrastructure Authority Revenue Bonds with the appropriate Series designation; and

**WHEREAS,** the Authority wishes to establish terms and conditions on said Fund F loans prior to the issuance of Authority Revenue Bonds and recognizes that additional planning and design of the financed projects are required.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY, ACTING BY AND THROUGH ITS BOARD OF DIRECTORS AS ITS DULY AUTHORIZED AND EMPOWERED GOVERNING BODY, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AND ORDER, AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1.</u> All statements of fact set forth in the preambles to this Resolution and Order are incorporated herein by reference, the same as if set forth verbatim. All such statements of fact are hereby declared to be true and accurate in all material respects.

<u>Section 2.</u> The Authority hereby authorizes the issuance of a conditional Federally Assisted Drinking Water Revolving Fund loan for an amount up to \$1,842,071 of project expense including capitalized interest for the construction period, to the Green-Taylor Water District for the System Improvements in Taylor County project. Such amounts are

subject to adjustment by further action of the Authority or may be adjusted by action of the Executive Director at the time of the issuance of bonds based on adjustment in project costs of not more than (10%) ten percent of the loan amount authorized by this resolution. Upon satisfaction of all conditions of the commitment, execution of an assistance agreement for this loan is authorized.

<u>Section 3.</u> The loan shall be repayable over 20 years at an interest rate of 1.75%. In addition to debt service, a 0.25% annual administration fee on the unpaid loan balance will be charged. From annual revenues, \$4,600 must be set aside in a borrower held replacement reserve each December 1 until the balance reaches \$92,000 and maintained for the life of the loan. These terms are subject to adjustment upon execution of the loan agreement, upon changes in the project conditions or determination that the project will require authority financing to be done on a taxable basis.

Section 4. This Resolution and Order shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption at a properly held meeting of the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority this 1<sup>st</sup> day of February 2018.

#### I. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Green-Taylor Water District is requesting a Fund F loan in the amount of \$1,842,071 for the System Improvements in Taylor County project. This project will replace problematic mains and utilize loops in an effort to improve service to existing customers, eliminate disinfection byproducts, and provide service to around 42 new customers. Two new loops will be created around HWY 323 and another around Bloyds Poplar Grove Road and an existing loop will be updated on Old Greensburg Road. A four inch water main will be replaced by six inch PVC line that serves the Summersville Community and the lines in the Shalawn subdivision will be replaced in order to address line breaks and substantial water loss in the area. A new line will be ran on Black Snake Creek Road in order to provide water service to citizens who have requested water service for several years. The District will also purchase two portable generators to be used in emergency situations. In addition, the District will create a Capital Improvement Plan in order to plan for future projects. This planning will utilize GPS to locate over 5,000 valves as well as meters and hydrants.

Green-Taylor Water District is a PSC regulated regional provider currently serving nearly 5,000 residents and businesses mainly in Green and Taylor counties. The District purchases approximately 350 MG of water from three providers including Campbellsville Municipal Water & Sewer System, Green River Valley Water District, and the Greensburg Water Department.

#### IX. FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Financial information was obtained from the audited financial statements for the years ended December 31, 2014 through December 31, 2016. The non-cash impact of GASB 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions, has been removed from fiscal 2015 and 2016 operating expenses. Percentage references in the History section below are based on whole dollar amounts and not the rounded amounts presented

#### **HISTORY**

Revenues increased 2% from \$2.30 million in 2014 to \$2.34 million in 2016. Operating expenses decreased 2% from \$1.97 million to \$1.92 million during the same time period. The debt coverage ratio was 1.0 in 2014, 1.1 in 2015, and 1.3 in 2016. The District has prepared a rate increase request for the PSC that will be submitted at the beginning of January 2018.

The balance sheet reflects a current ratio of 5.3, a debt to equity ratio of 0.6, 42.1 days sales in accounts receivable, and 4.9 months operating expenses in unrestricted cash.

#### **PROJECTIONS**

Projections are based on the following assumptions:

- 1) Revenues will increase 15% in 2019 as a result of a proposed rate increase.
- 2) Operating expenses will increase 2% for inflation.
- 3) Debt service coverage is 1.4 in 2019 when principal and interest repayments begin.

Based on the pro forma assumptions, the utility shows adequate cash flow to repay the KIA Fund F loan.

# REPLACEMENT RESERVE

The replacement reserve will be 5% (\$92,000 total) of the final amount borrowed (prior to principal forgiveness, if any) to be funded annually (\$4,600 yearly) each December 1 for 20 years and maintained for the life of the loan.

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A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR A FEDERALLY ASSISTED DRINKING WATER REVOLVING FUND LOAN (F18-006) FOR AN AMOUNT UP TO \$2,641,680 TO THE CITY OF LEBANON, MARION COUNTY, KENTUCKY

**WHEREAS**, the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (the "Authority") has been duly created as a body corporate and politic constituting a public corporation and a governmental agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky pursuant to Chapter 224A of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Act, the Authority is duly and legally authorized to make loans to Governmental Agencies for the purpose of providing funds for the construction and acquisition of sanitary sewer facilities, water facilities or other types of infrastructure, and in that regard, to enter into Assistance Agreements with such Governmental Agencies governing the provisions in respect of which such loans are to be made, the amounts thereof and the repayment provisions in respect thereto; and

**WHEREAS**, the Authority anticipates entering into an Assistance Agreement for a loan from the Authority's Federally Assisted Drinking Water Revolving Loan Program (Fund F) with the City of Lebanon, subject to final determination of amount when the factors involving such financing have been determined; and

**WHEREAS**, the Authority will, in the near future, authorize and issue a series of Infrastructure Authority Revenue Bonds for the purpose of funding loans to various governmental agencies, such series of Bonds to be known as Kentucky Infrastructure Authority Revenue Bonds with the appropriate Series designation; and

**WHEREAS,** the Authority wishes to establish terms and conditions on said Fund F loans prior to the issuance of Authority Revenue Bonds and recognizes that additional planning and design of the financed projects are required.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY, ACTING BY AND THROUGH ITS BOARD OF DIRECTORS AS ITS DULY AUTHORIZED AND EMPOWERED GOVERNING BODY, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AND ORDER, AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1.</u> All statements of fact set forth in the preambles to this Resolution and Order are incorporated herein by reference, the same as if set forth verbatim. All such statements of fact are hereby declared to be true and accurate in all material respects.

<u>Section 2.</u> The Authority hereby authorizes the issuance of a conditional Federally Assisted Drinking Water Revolving Fund loan for an amount up to \$2,641,680 of project expense including capitalized interest for the construction period, to the City of Lebanon for the Water Works System Improvements project. Such amounts are subject to

adjustment by further action of the Authority or may be adjusted by action of the Executive Director at the time of the issuance of bonds based on adjustment in project costs of not more than (10%) ten percent of the loan amount authorized by this resolution. Upon satisfaction of all conditions of the commitment, execution of an assistance agreement for this loan is authorized.

<u>Section 3.</u> Principal forgiveness not to exceed \$1,000,000 will be deducted from the approved loan amount. The unforgiven principal balance of \$1,641,680 shall be repaid.

Section 4. The unforgiven principal shall be repayable over 30 years at an interest rate of 0.50%. In addition to debt service, a 0.25% annual administration fee on the unpaid, unforgiven principal balance will be charged. From annual revenues, \$6,600 must be set aside in a borrower held replacement reserve each December 1 until the balance reaches \$132,000 and maintained for the life of the loan. These terms are subject to adjustment upon execution of the loan agreement, upon changes in the project conditions or determination that the project will require authority financing to be done on a taxable basis.

<u>Section 5.</u> This Resolution and Order shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption at a properly held meeting of the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority this 1<sup>st</sup> day of February, 2018.

### I. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The City of Lebanon is requesting a Fund F loan in the amount of \$2,641,680 for the Lebanon Water Works System Improvements project. This project will replace approximately 22,000 linear feet of 2, 4 and 6 inch cast iron water main with 6 inch PVC pipe in the western section of the City. The existing cast iron piping in this area has been prone to frequent leaks, breaks and service disruptions. The replacement will include service connections to reduce leakage and provide high quality services. Modifications and upgrades will be made at the existing water treatment plant to improve water quality and efficiency. A gravity sludge thickener, a settling basin scraper, and a new fluoride room will be installed in addition to replacement of 4 existing filter media units as well as energy efficiency improvements to the raw water intake. It will also add a belt press to reduce discharge and improve discharge water quality.

The Lebanon Water Works is a wholesale provider to the Marion County Water District. The latest rate increase was filed with the PSC but disputed by the Marion District. The PSC has issued an order to suspend the effective date of the proposed rate increase from November 15, 2017 to April 14, 2018.

### VIII. 2017 CAPITALIZATION GRANT EQUIVALENCIES

- 1) Green Project Reserve The Drinking Water capitalization grant does not contain a "green" requirement.
- 2) Additional Subsidization This project qualifies for additional subsidization in the amount of \$1,000,000.

### IX. FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Financial information was obtained from the audited financial statements for the years ended June 30, 2015 through June 30, 2017. The non-cash impact of GASB 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions, has been removed from fiscal 2015, 2016, and 2017 operating expenses.

### **HISTORY**

Operating revenue increased 2.4% from \$2,644,714 in 2015 to \$2,708,423 in 2017. Operating expenses increased 15.7% from \$1,550,832 in 2015 to \$1,794,032 in 2017 due to additional personnel costs related to new employee training prior to operator retirements in 2016 and 2017. The debt coverage ratio was 1.8, 2.6 and 2.2 for years 2015 through 2017 respectively.

The balance sheet reflects a current ratio of 2.1, a debt to equity ratio of 1.0, 48.1 days of sales in accounts receivable, and 4.8 months of operating expenses in unrestricted cash.

### **PROJECTIONS**

Projections are based on the following assumptions:

- 1) Revenues will go up approximately 11% by 2019 due to a previously approved rate increase of 25.6% effective November 15, 2017 for the City. The increase from wholesale water to the Marion County Water District is excluded from the projection due to the pending status of PSC approval.
- 2) Operating expenses will increase for water purchase from the City of Campbellsville and general inflation.
- 3) Debt service coverage is 1.2 in 2020 when full year principal and interest repayments are expected to begin.

Based on the pro forma assumptions, the utility shows adequate cash flow to repay the KIA Fund F loan.

### REPLACEMENT RESERVE

The replacement reserve will be 5% of the final amount borrowed prior to the 1,000,000 principal forgiveness to be funded annually each December 1 for 20 years and maintained for the life of the loan.

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A RESOLUTION OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY **AUTHORIZING AND APPROVING THE ISSUANCE OF OBLIGATIONS** OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY TO REIMBURSE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES MADE BY GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES PURSUANT TO LOANS MADE BY THE **KENTUCKY** INFRASTRUCTURE **AUTHORITY TO** SUCH **GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES** 

**WHEREAS**, the Board of Directors of the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (the "Authority") has heretofore approved the undertaking of the projects described in further detail in Exhibit A (collectively, the "Project"); and

**WHEREAS**, the Authority anticipates making loans to governmental agencies pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 224A of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Act") for the Project and the governmental agencies may be expected to pay and/or incur costs with respect to the Project ("Prior Capital Expenditures") on or after the date of this resolution and prior to the issuance of the obligations (the "Obligations") which will finance the Project.

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED** by the Board of Directors of the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority as follows:

**Section 1.** The Board of Directors hereby approves the use of the Obligations to finance the costs of the Project in the maximum principal amount set forth in <a href="Exhibit A">Exhibit A</a> plus costs of issuance related thereto and amounts required to fund a debt service reserve, if any, and declares its intent that any Prior Capital Expenditures made by the governmental agencies pursuant to loans made by the Authority will be made in anticipation of the issuance of such Obligations to reimburse said Prior Capital Expenditures. This declaration is made pursuant to Treas. Reg. §1.150-2.

**Section 2.** The Executive Director and Treasurer of the Authority are hereby authorized and directed to reimburse, not later than eighteen months after the later of (i) the date of the expenditure or (ii) the date the item was placed in service, but in any event not later than three years after the original expenditure, only those Prior Capital Expenditures made with respect to assets having a reasonably expected economic life of at least one year, and in addition, eligible preliminary expenditures paid and incurred prior to commencement of the Project.

**Section 3.** The Authority finds and determines that, consistent with the Authority's budgetary and financial circumstances, it does not have funds currently available and does not expect to have funds available in the future that may be allocated on a long-term basis, other than the proceeds of the Obligations, to finance the Prior Capital Expenditures.

**Section 4.** The Authority hereby directs the Executive Director, Secretary, and Treasurer to take the following action at the time the Prior Capital Expenditures are reimbursed from proceeds of the Obligations: (i) evidence the reimbursement on the books and records maintained with respect to the Obligations, and (ii) identify either the actual prior expenditure to be reimbursed or, in the case of reimbursement of a fund or account, the fund or account from which the expenditure was paid.

**Section 5.** The books, records and proceedings of the Authority with respect to this resolution shall be made reasonably available by the Authority for its inspection by the general public at the Authority's administrative office every business day during normal business hours commencing no later than 30 days after the passage of this resolution. Said books, record and proceedings of the Authority with respect to this resolution will continue to be reasonably available to the general public until the date of issuance of the Obligations.

**Section 6.** This Resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption. Passed and adopted this 1st day of February, 2018.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY (AUTHORITY) AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF AN ESCROW TRUST AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE AUTHORITY AND U.S. BANK NATIONAL ASSOCIATION TO PROVIDE FOR THE DEFEASANCE AND DISCHARGE OF ALL OR A PORTION OF THE AUTHORITY'S OUTSTANDING KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY WASTEWATER AND DRINKING WATER REVOLVING FUND PROGRAM REVENUE BONDS, SERIES 2010A (THE "PRIOR 2010 BONDS") **AND** KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE **AUTHORITY** WASTEWATER AND DRINKING WATER REVOLVING FUND PROGRAM REVENUE BONDS, SERIES 2012A (THE "PRIOR 2012 BONDS," AND TOGETHER WITH THE PRIOR 2010 BONDS, THE "PRIOR BONDS"); AUTHORIZING OTHER ACTIONS IN CONNECTION WITH THE DEFEASANCE AND DISCHARGE OF ALL OR A PORTION OF THE PRIOR BONDS: AND REPEALING ALL RESOLUTIONS OR PARTS THEREOF IN CONFLICT WITH THE PROVISIONS HEREOF.

WHEREAS, the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, being the duly and legally constituted legislature of Kentucky, at its 1988 Regular Session, enacted House Bill 217 amending Chapter 224A of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Act"), creating the "Kentucky Infrastructure Authority" (the "Authority") to serve the public purposes identified in the Act; and

WHEREAS, Title VI of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended by the Water Quality Act of 1987 (collectively, the "Wastewater Act") authorizes the United States Environmental Protection Agency (the "EPA") to award grants to qualifying states to establish and capitalize state water pollution control revolving funds for the purpose of providing loans and certain other forms of financial assistance to finance, among other things, the construction of publicly-owned wastewater treatment facilities, estuary conservation management plans and the implementation of nonpoint source management programs (the "Wastewater Program"); and

WHEREAS, the General Assembly, pursuant to Chapter 437 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, 1988 Regular Session, authorized the

establishment and financing of a wastewater revolving fund, as described in Section 224A.111 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Wastewater Revolving Fund"), to be administered by the Authority, in order to carry out the public purposes of the Act and the Wastewater Act; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 6A of the Public Health Service Act, as amended (the "Drinking Water Act," and together with the Wastewater Act, the "Federal Acts") authorizes EPA to award grants to qualifying states to establish and capitalize state revolving funds from which a state can provide loans and certain other forms of financial assistance to finance drinking water system improvements (the "Drinking Water Program," and together with the Wastewater Program, the "Programs"); and

WHEREAS, the General Assembly, pursuant to Chapter 373 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, 1994 Regular Session, amended the Act and authorized the establishment and financing of a water supply revolving fund, as described in Section 224A.1115 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Drinking Water Revolving Fund," and together with the Wastewater Revolving Fund, the "Revolving Funds"), to be administered by the Authority, in order to carry out the public purposes of the Act and the Drinking Water Act; and

WHEREAS, the Act provides that the Authority may issue revenue bonds or notes for the purpose of providing funds and moneys to the Authority to enable it to enter into Assistance Agreements (as hereinafter defined) with borrowers qualified under the Act and the Federal Acts to acquire and lease capital projects eligible for financing under the Act and the Federal Acts (collectively, the "Projects") to Borrowers, to purchase or refinance obligations of Borrowers issued for Projects, to make loans or grants for Projects, and to enable the Authority generally to carry out and effectuate its proper corporate purposes.

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Federal Acts, obligations issued to finance Assistance Agreements with Borrowers under the Wastewater Program are to be payable primarily from the assets of the Wastewater Program and obligations issued to finance Assistance Agreements with Borrowers under the Drinking Water Program are to be payable primarily from the assets of the Drinking Water Program; provided however that upon satisfaction of certain conditions set forth in the Federal Acts, and the regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, financing for the Programs on a consolidated basis may be undertaken and provisions may be made for cross-collateralization and the transfer of assets between the Wastewater Program and the Drinking Water Program; and

WHEREAS, in furtherance of the foregoing, and in compliance with the Act, the Authority heretofore entered into a General Trust Indenture dated as of March 1, 2010 (the "General Trust Indenture") with U.S. Bank National Association, Louisville, Kentucky (the "Trustee") to provide for (a) the issuance from time to time of revenue bonds of the Authority (the "Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Bonds") to finance and refinance Projects, (b) the security in respect of the Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Bonds, (c) protecting and enforcing rights and remedies of the holders of the Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Bonds, (d) the custody, safeguarding, and application of all Authority revenues pledged for the payment of the Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Bonds, (e) the duties and responsibilities of the trustee named thereunder, and (f) inter alia, all other necessary and desirable provisions with respect to the Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Bonds, including covenants of the Authority with regard thereto; and

WHEREAS, the Authority has determined that in order to achieve debt service savings it is necessary and desirable at this time to provide for the defeasance and discharge of all or a portion of the currently outstanding Kentucky Infrastructure Authority Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Revenue Bonds, Series 2010A (the "Prior 2010 Bonds") and Kentucky Infrastructure Authority Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Revenue Bonds, Series 2012A (the "Prior 2012 Bonds," and together with the Prior 2010 Bonds, the "Prior Bonds") issued under authority of the General Trust Indenture.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Execution and Delivery of Escrow Trust Agreement. In order to provide for the defeasance and discharge of all or a portion of the Prior Bonds (the "Defeased Bonds"), legally available cash funds of the Authority shall be deposited in escrow in an amount necessary, together with the investment and reinvestment thereof, to pay the principal of, and interest on, the Defeased Bonds through and including the first date on which the Defeased Bonds may be called for redemption and to redeem the Defeased Bonds on such date, all such funds deposited in escrow to be applied in accordance with an escrow trust agreement (the "Escrow Trust Agreement") between the Authority and U.S. Bank National Association, Louisville, Kentucky, substantially in the same form of such Escrow Trust Agreement attached hereto as Exhibit A. The Escrow Trust Agreement is incorporated by reference in this Resolution as fully as if copied in full herein. The Chair and Secretary be and they are hereby authorized to execute and deliver on behalf of the Authority the Escrow Trust Agreement, subject to such changes, additions and deletions as may be approved by the officers executing the

same, such execution and delivery to be conclusive evidence of the approval of any such changes, additions and deletions.

Section 2. Further Actions Authorized. The Chair, Executive Director, Treasurer and Secretary of the Authority are each individually authorized and directed to take all such further actions as may be necessary or desirable to effect the defeasance and discharge of the Defeased Bonds in accordance with the intent of this Resolution and the Escrow Trust Agreement, including, without limitation, approving and executing any instruments related to the acquisition of securities for deposit in the escrow fund established under the Escrow Trust Agreement, filing notices of defeasance of the Defeased Bonds with appropriate entities or governmental bodies, securing any necessary further approvals from any governmental agency or authority to effect the defeasance of the Defeased Bonds, and securing the assistance of the Authority's financial advisor, bond counsel and others in accomplishing the foregoing.

Section 3. Conflicts Repealed. All provisions of the various resolutions passed and adopted by the Authority, to the extent, but only to the extent, the same conflict with the provisions of this Resolution are hereby repealed and the provisions of this Resolution and the Escrow Trust Agreement shall govern all matters relating to the defeasance and discharge of the Defeased Bonds.

Section 4. Severability. If any section, paragraph or provision of this Resolution shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Resolution.

<u>Section 5.</u> <u>Open Meetings</u>. The Authority hereby finds and determines that all formal actions relative to the adoption of this Resolution were taken in an open meeting of the

Authority, and that all deliberations of the Authority and of its committees, if any, which resulted in formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in full compliance with applicable legal requirements.

<u>Section 6</u>. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall be in full force and effect, as provided by law.

WHEREAS, the General Assembly, pursuant to Chapter 373 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, 1994 Regular Session, amended the Act and authorized the establishment and financing of a water supply revolving fund, as described in Section 224A.1115 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Drinking Water Revolving Fund," and together with the Wastewater Revolving Fund, the "Revolving Funds"), to be administered by the Authority, in order to carry out the public purposes of the Act and the Drinking Water Act; and

WHEREAS, the Act provides that the Authority may issue revenue bonds or notes for the purpose of providing funds and moneys to the Authority to enable it to enter into Assistance Agreements (as hereinafter defined) with borrowers qualified under the Act and the Federal Acts to acquire and lease capital projects eligible for financing under the Act and the Federal Acts (collectively, the "Projects") to Borrowers, to purchase or refinance obligations of Borrowers issued for Projects, to make loans or grants for Projects, and to enable the Authority generally to carry out and effectuate its proper corporate purposes.

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Federal Acts, obligations issued to finance Assistance Agreements with Borrowers under the Wastewater Program are to be payable primarily from the assets of the Wastewater Program and obligations issued to finance Assistance Agreements with Borrowers under the Drinking Water Program are to be payable primarily from the assets of the Drinking Water Program; provided however that upon satisfaction of certain conditions set forth in the Federal Acts, and the regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, financing for the Programs on a consolidated basis may be undertaken and provisions may be made for cross-collateralization and the transfer of assets between the Wastewater Program and the Drinking Water Program; and

WHEREAS, the Authority has determined it is necessary and desirable at this time to provide for the issuance of Bonds (as hereinafter defined) in order to finance the Programs on a consolidated basis in accordance with the Act and the Federal Acts and to make provision for the cross-collateralization and the transfer of assets between the Wastewater Program and the Drinking Water Program in accordance with the Federal Acts and regulations promulgated pursuant thereto; and

WHEREAS, in furtherance of the foregoing, and in compliance with the Act, the Authority heretofore entered into a General Trust Indenture dated as of March 1, 2010 (the "General Trust Indenture") with U.S. Bank National Association, Louisville, Kentucky (the "Trustee") to provide for (a) the issuance from time to time of revenue bonds of the Authority (the "Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Bonds") to finance and refinance Projects, (b) the security in respect of the Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Bonds, (c) protecting and enforcing rights and remedies of the holders of the Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Bonds, (d) the custody, safeguarding, and

application of all Authority revenues pledged for the payment of the Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Bonds, (e) the duties and responsibilities of the trustee named thereunder, and (f) inter alia, all other necessary and desirable provisions with respect to the Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Bonds, including covenants of the Authority with regard thereto; and

WHEREAS, the Authority has committed to enter into certain assistance agreements with Borrowers under the Programs ("Assistance Agreements"), and has determined that, pursuant to the provisions of this Preliminary Bond Resolution, the General Trust Indenture and a certain series trust indenture between the Authority and the Trustee dated as of March 1, 2018 (the "Series 2018A Trust Indenture"), it is necessary and desirable at this time to provide for the issuance by the Authority of a series of Senior Bonds (as defined in the General Trust Indenture) constituting Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Bonds, which Senior Bonds are to be designated as "Kentucky Infrastructure Authority Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Revenue Bonds, Series 2018A" (the "Series 2018A Bonds"), in order to provide moneys to fund the Programs and the Projects, all as permitted by the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Authority hereby readopts and affirms the General Trust Indenture attached hereto as Exhibit A as if fully set forth herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. <u>Issuance of Bonds</u>; Execution and Delivery of Series Indenture Authorized. There are hereby authorized Senior Bonds of the Authority to be designated as "Kentucky Infrastructure Authority Wastewater and Drinking Water Revolving Fund Program Revenue Bonds, Series 2018A" (the "Series 2018A Bonds") in an aggregate principal amount not to

exceed \$60,000,000. In connection with the issuance of the Series 2018A Bonds, the Chair and Secretary of the Authority be and they are hereby authorized to execute on behalf of the Authority the Series 2018A Trust Indenture with the Trustee governing the issuance of the Series 2018A Bonds, in substantially the same form as the document attached hereto as Exhibit B, with such changes therein not inconsistent with this Preliminary Bond Resolution or the General Trust Indenture and not substantially adverse to the Authority as may be permitted by the Act and approved by the officers executing the same on behalf of the Authority. The approval of such changes by said officers, and that such are not substantially adverse to the Authority, shall be conclusively evidenced by the execution of such Series 2018A Trust Indenture by such officers. The Series 2018A Trust Indenture, including the form of Series 2018A Bonds, is hereby incorporated by reference in this Preliminary Bond Resolution as fully as if copied in full herein. The Series 2018A Bonds shall mature and shall bear interest from their dated date at the rates set forth in the Series 2018A Trust Indenture.

<u>Section 2</u>. <u>Effective Date of Series 2018A Trust Indenture</u>. The Series 2018A Trust Indenture shall become effective upon the date of execution and delivery thereof by the Chair and Secretary of the Authority and the duly authorized officer of the Trustee.

Section 3. Execution and Delivery of Purchase Contract. The sale and delivery of the Series 2018A Bonds to Morgan Stanley & Co. LLC (the "Underwriter"), shall be undertaken upon the terms and conditions to be set forth in a purchase contract for the Series 2018A Bonds (the "Purchase Contract") with the Underwriter. The Executive Committee of the Authority (the "Executive Committee") is hereby authorized to approve the execution, delivery and performance of the Purchase Contract for the Series 2018A Bonds authorized hereunder, subject to such changes, additions and deletions and at the interest rates as may be approved by the

Executive Committee, and the officers of the Authority are hereby authorized, upon adoption of the resolution of the Executive Committee approving and authorizing the Purchase Contract and establishing the final principal amount of the Series 2018A Bonds, to execute and deliver the Purchase Contract to the Underwriter, which execution and delivery shall be conclusive evidence of the approval of the price, interest rates and any aforesaid changes, additions and deletions.

Section 4. Approval, Execution, Use and Distribution of the Official Statement. The staff of the Authority is hereby directed to prepare, with the assistance of the Underwriter a Preliminary Official Statement (the "Preliminary Official Statement") and Official Statement (the "Official Statement") for the Series 2018A Bonds, in the customary forms, which Preliminary Official Statement and Official Statement shall be approved by the Executive Director prior to their distribution in connection with the sale of the Series 2018A Bonds. The Authority hereby authorizes the Executive Director to make the determination at the applicable time that the Preliminary Official Statement is in final form in accordance with Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12, as amended (the "Rule"). The officers of the Authority are hereby authorized to execute the Official Statement, in substantially the form as approved subsequently by the Executive Director, subject to such changes, additions and deletions as may be approved by the Chair, Executive Director or other officer of the Authority, which execution and delivery shall be conclusive evidence of the approval of any aforesaid changes, additions and deletions. The Authority shall provide a final Official Statement to the Underwriter within seven (7) business days of the date of sale of the Series 2018A Bonds in accordance with the Rule.

Section 5. Approval, Execution and Delivery of Continuing Disclosure Agreement. In order to enable the Underwriter to comply with the continuing disclosure requirements of the Rule, the Authority hereby covenants and agrees that in connection with the issuance of the

Series 2018A Bonds it will execute, comply with and carry out all of the provisions of a continuing disclosure agreement between the Authority and the Trustee dated as of March 1, 2018 (the "Continuing Disclosure Agreement") for the Series 2018A Bonds. Failure to comply with any such provisions of the Continuing Disclosure Agreement shall not constitute a default on the Series 2018A Bonds; however, any holder of the Series 2018A Bonds, including any beneficial owner of the Series 2018A Bonds, may take such action as may be necessary and appropriate, including seeking specific performance, to cause the Authority to comply with its obligations under the applicable Continuing Disclosure Agreement. The Chair and Secretary be and they are hereby authorized to execute on behalf of the Authority the Continuing Disclosure Agreement, in substantially the same form as the document attached hereto as Exhibit C, which Continuing Disclosure Agreement is incorporated by reference in this Preliminary Bond Resolution as fully as if copied in full herein.

Section 6. Conflicts Repealed. All provisions of the various resolutions passed and adopted by the Authority, to the extent, but only to the extent, the same conflict with the provisions of this Preliminary Bond Resolution, the General Trust Indenture and Series 2018A Trust Indenture are hereby repealed and the provisions of this Preliminary Bond Resolution and the General Trust Indenture and Series 2018A Trust Indenture shall govern all matters relating to the sale and issuance of said Series 2018A Bonds, the disbursement of the Series 2018A Bond proceeds, and the future application of the funds and accounts established in the General Trust Indenture.

<u>Section 7</u>. <u>Severability</u>. If any section, paragraph or provision of this Preliminary Bond Resolution shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the invalidity or

unenforceability of such section, paragraph or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Preliminary Bond Resolution.

Section 8. Open Meetings. The Authority hereby finds and determines that all formal actions relative to the adoption of this Preliminary Bond Resolution were taken in an open meeting of the Authority, and that all deliberations of the Authority and of its committees, if any, which resulted in formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in full compliance with applicable legal requirements.

<u>Section 10</u>. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Preliminary Bond Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall be in full force and effect, as provided by law.
