PROCEEDINGS

Commissioner Sandra K. Dunahoo, Chair, called the meeting of the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (KIA) Board to order. She asked Mr. Will Rich, DLG Staff Attorney, to confirm the press notification distribution as well as the presence of a quorum. Guests were asked to introduce themselves.

I. <u>BUSINESS (Board Action Required)</u>

A. 1. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

For: KIA Regular Board Meeting of March 7, 2019

Mr. Claude Christensen moved to approve the minutes of the March 7, 2019, regular board meeting. Judge David Voegele seconded, and the motion carried unanimously.

- **B. NEW PROJECTS/ACTION ITEMS**
 - 1. A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR ASSUMPTION OF THE CLEAN WATER STATE REVOLVING FUND LOAN (A98-04) IN AN AMOUNT UP TO \$1,103,340 BY THE LOUISVILLE AND JEFFERSON COUNTY METROPOLITAN SEWER DISTRICT, JEFFERSON COUNTY, KENTUCKY FROM THE CITY OF CRESTWOOD, OLDHAM COUNTY, KENTUCKY

Mr. Russell Neal, DOW and Ms. Ashley Adams, KIA, discussed the Louisville and Jefferson County Metropolitan Sewer District's ("MSD") assumption of a Fund A wastewater loan (A98-04) from the City of Crestwood in Oldham County as part of MSD's acquisition of the Crestwood wastewater system and all of its assets. The original loan to Crestwood included a sewer collection system for the residents of Crestwood and Park Lake which transported waste to MSD's Hite Creek Plant. The original loan was approved by the KIA Board on April 28th, 1998. MSD entered into an Interlocal Agreement with the City of Crestwood on September 3, 1996. Since then MSD has provided operational and maintenance services to Crestwood for wastewater collection and treatment, responded to customer calls, provided billing services, and managed regulatory programs such as the Consent Decree. Kentucky Revised Statutes changed in 2018 allowing for an acquisition of the Crestwood system by MSD. This acquisition is attractive to both parties in order to continue a high level of service while maintaining a competitive billing rate for existing Crestwood customers. For MSD, the acquisition gives MSD the opportunity to provide wastewater services to potential development in the area and achieve greater economies of scale.

Mr. Bob Amato moved to approve the Louisville and Jefferson County Metropolitan Sewer District's assumption of the City of Crestwood's Fund A Loan (A98-04) for an amount up to \$1,103,340 with the standard conditions. Mr. Claude Christensen seconded and the motion was unanimously approved.

2. COMMISSIONER DUNAHOO NOTED THAT THE LOAN THAT WAS ORIGINALLY LISTED AS AGENDA ITEM NUMBER 2 FOR THE OLDHAM COUNTY ENVIRONMENTAL AUTHORITY (OCEA) WOULD NOT BE PRESENTED AT THIS TIME.

Mr. Bob Amato moved to table Agenda Item #2 for the Oldham County Environmental Authority. Mr. Paul Lashbrooke seconded and the motion was unanimously approved.

3. A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR A FEDERALLY ASSISTED CLEAN WATER REVOLVING FUND LOAN (A19-050) FOR AN AMOUNT UP TO \$10,142,000 TO THE CITY OF RICHMOND, MADISON COUNTY, KENTUCKY

Mr. Russell Neal, DOW and Ms. Ashley Adams, KIA, discussed the City of Richmond's request for a Fund A Loan, (A19-050) in an amount up to \$10,142,000 the Silver Creek Outfall Sewer Phase 1 project. The purpose of this project is to eliminate known overflows and provide additional capacity in the collection system for future growth. In 2009, soon after the construction of the Otter Creek Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP), two existing WWTP's (Dreaming Creek and Tates Creek) were taken off-line with flows directed to this new large WWTP. The other large WWTP (Silver Creek), was built in the summer of 1999 to treat waste generated on the south side of Richmond, primarily the area along Duncannon Road and the new industrial park. This project will eliminate this Kentucky Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (KPDES) permit and convey flows through the existing conveyance system to the Otter Creek WWTP.

<u>Division A</u> - Silver Creek WWTP to Existing Pavilion Force Main The existing Silver Creek WWTP will be used as an equalization basin to store wet weather flows. A new 1,500 gallon per minute (gpm) pump station will be built at the Silver Creek WWTP site along with 14,500 linear feet (If) of 16 - inch force main that will discharge into an existing 14 - inch force main for approximately 10,500 lf to a point of discharge at the existing Pavilion pump station. The Pavilion pump station will be de-commissioned and all flows will be diverted to the new Taylor Fork gravity Sewer

<u>Division B</u> – Taylor Fork Gravity Sewer Flows from the Silver Creek and Pavilion pump stations will be diverted to approximately 3,500 lf of 30 inch, 11,500 lf of 24 inch gravity sewer and approximately 49 manholes along Taylor Fork. This line will discharge into the existing Wilgreen pump station on the west side of Interstate 75.

<u>Division C</u> – TC-15 Collector Sewers The TC15 drainage basin of the Richmond Utilities Sanitary Sewer Collection System is subject to frequent wet weather induced overflows at three primary locations: TC15- M4- 11, TC15-M8-18, and TC15-M10-3. This division of the project will replace 47 approximately 1,500 lf of 15 inch and 2,550 lf of 12 inch gravity sewer along with 25 manhole replacements.

<u>Division D</u> – Wilgreen Parallel Force Main The existing Wilgreen pump station is capable of pumping a peak flow of approximately 2,500 gpm through the existing 12 inch force main. This project will extend a second 12 inch force main parallel to the existing force main for approximately 4,900 lf. The new force main will add approximately 1,100 gpm of peak capacity to the Wilgreen pump station for a total peak flow of 3,600 gpm. Richmond Water, Gas, and Sewerage Works provides sanitary sewer service to almost 12,000 residential, commercial, and industrial customers in Madison County.

Mr. Mark Bunning moved to approve the Fund A Loan (A19-050) for an amount up to \$10,142,000 with the standard conditions. Mr. Claude Christian seconded and the motion was unanimously approved.

4. A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR AN INFRASTRUCTURE REVOLVING FUND LOAN (B19-009) FOR AN AMOUNT UP TO \$397,000 TO THE CITY OF HICKMAN, FULTON COUNTY, KENTUCKY

Ms. Meili Sun, KIA, discussed the City of Hickman's request for a Fund B loan (B19-009) in the amount of \$397,000 for the Water Treatment Plant Modification project. This project will repurpose the currently idle old plant with its basins sitting empty. The scope of work includes installing piping and pumps to utilize the sediment and flocculation basins in the old water treatment plant to add detention time prior to the filters for iron and manganese removal. It will also repair and/or replace the aerators in the existing plant to improve oxidation of iron and manganese.

The purpose of this project is to improve drinking water quality for approximately 1,300 customers while addressing the requirements of an agreed order issued by the Division of Water.

Mr. Mark Bunning moved to approve the Fund B Loan (B19-009) for an amount up to \$397,000 with the standard conditions and the following special condition: The City shall pass an ordinance by May 31, 2019 to increase both water and sewer rates. The new rates shall raise additional \$58,000 or 8% of the total revenues, effective July 1, 2019. Judge David Voegele seconded and the motion was unanimously approved.

5. A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR A FEDERALLY ASSISTED DRINKING WATER REVOLVING FUND LOAN (F19-042) FOR AN AMOUNT UP TO \$4,918,257 TO THE CITY OF DANVILLE, BOYLE COUNTY, KENTUCKY

Mr. Russell Neal, DOW, and Ms. Meili Sun, KIA, discussed the City of Danville's request for a Drinking Water SRF loan (F19-042) in the amount of \$4,918,257 for the Danville – Perryville Standpipe Replacement and Water Main project. The project will replace the 100,000 gallon standpipe on the east side of Perryville with a 750,000 gallon elevated tank, and construct an 800 GPM pump station that will be located on Perryville Road near Locklin Lane. The current standpipe is outdated, undersized, and does not have adequate turnover. The new elevated tank will be fed by approximately 17,500 LF of new 12-inch water main that will start at Coldwell Road and will parallel Perryville Road West to the new tank site. It will provide additional storage capacity to meet both current and future demands.

Approximately 35% (470 million gallons) of water produced by the utility is sold to wholesale customers including four PSC regulated entities (Garrard County Water Association, Lake Village Water Association, Parksville Water District, and North Mercer Water District) and three municipals (City of Hustonville, City of Springfield, and City of Stanford).

Mr. Claude Christensen moved to approve the Fund F Loan (F19-042) for an amount up to \$4,918,257 with the standard conditions. Mr. Bob Amato seconded and the motion was unanimously approved.

6. RESOLUTION OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING AND APPROVING THE ISSUANCE OF OBLIGATIONS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY TO REIMBURSE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES MADE BY GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES PURSUANT TO LOANS MADE BY THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY TO SUCH GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES

Ms. Gwen Pinson moved to approve the reimbursement resolution. Mr. Bob Amato seconded and the motion carried unanimously.

II. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Director McNeil directed everyone's attention to the TV monitor. Now available on the WRIS Portal table of the KIA website, is a Dashboard developed by KIA staff member Dustin Horn. There are versions. The first is based on the needs in the state for drinking water and wastewater. Information can be filtered by Area Development District, region, county or even facility. Currently, the needs are documented at \$5 billion. This includes projects moving forward for the next 20 years that are seeking state or federal funding in Kentucky. The numbers are different than those put out on the American Society of Civil Engineers' (ASCE) report card because not all utilities are seeking state or Federal funding. Some of the information gathered by the Area Development Districts is outdated, as demonstrated by this Dashboard. It is so important to keep information up-to-date, especially pertaining to budgeting their projects. The second version is designed to be viewed by phones or tablets. The third version sorts information based on the Senate and House Districts, currently by District Number. A future version plans to include the Senator or Representatives' name for search purposes Dustin has done a great job and has additional ideas for other Dashboards.

Director McNeil and Jeff Abshire have been working on the six year Capital Plan, which is due to the Capital Plan Advisory Board by April 15th. KIA is requesting \$180 million each Biennium that includes \$77.5 million for Federal Capitalization Grants, \$15.5 million for the state match, the authorization to leverage bonds at \$60 million, and a General Fund contribution to Fund B at \$25 million. Staff does not anticipate any bond leveraging, but wants to have the ability to have the authorization should it

be necessary. KIA has historically asked for \$10 million for Fund B, which has not allocated. Of the \$25 million requested from the General Fund for the Fund B program we hope to fund failing package treatment plants for consolidation with public utilities, assisting with water loss and regionalization and promote sustainability. KIA does not have the ability to leverage funds in Fund B funding from the General Fund would provide the opportunity to revolve the funds over time. Jeff will be working on finalizing the plan for submission.

Later this year, KIA will be applying for a new EPA grant regarding small and disadvantaged communities and drinking water program. This program will assist utilities in returning their systems to compliance. Funding can be used for planning and design, construction, technical and managerial compliance, water loss and various other things, but requires the 2 CFR requiring engineering procurement. The state has to provide the match, which is included in the Capital Plan. Congress allocated \$20 million with the WIIN Act in 2016, which is to be available to all the state SRF Funds. Kentucky's allocation is estimated to be \$400,000 to \$750,000 that requires a 45% match. EPA has stated the grant will be available for four years. KIA will have to develop an Intended Use Plan, a Call for Projects and a strategy for how the funding will be used. Director McNeil has inquired to see if water loss projects would be eligible and has not gotten final approval, but feels as if it will be approved. When drafted, the Intended Use Plan will need to be posted and a 30 day public comment period would be applicable.

KIA will be moving their offices beginning the week of April 22nd, to 100 Airport Road. Following the move, information will be sent out regarding the new location with directions, parking and security information for future attendance at KIA Board meetings. KIA By-Laws will need to be updated with the new location for meeting location.

Director McNeil, Deputy Director Bridwell and Mr. Jeff Abshire will be attending the Council of Infrastructure Financing Authorities (CIFA) Conference in Washington, DC the week of April 22nd. Director McNeil serves as Co-Chair as the EPA State Workgroup Committee.

A replacement for Linda Bridwell's seat on the Board has not been filled at this time, but KIA hopes to have someone in place very soon.

Ms. Sheryl Parsons, Project Officer with EPA Region 4 will be conducting the annual EPA audit during the week of May 20-25th.

A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR A FEDERALLY ASSISTED CLEAN WATER REVOLVING FUND LOAN (A19-002) FOR AN AMOUNT UP TO \$3,359,566 TO THE CITY OF LOUISA, LAWRENCE COUNTY, KENTUCKY

WHEREAS, the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (the "Authority") has been duly created as a body corporate and politic constituting a public corporation and a governmental agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky pursuant to Chapter 224A of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Act, the Authority is duly and legally authorized to make loans to Governmental Agencies for the purpose of providing funds for the construction and acquisition of sanitary sewer facilities, water facilities or other types of infrastructure, and in that regard, to enter into Assistance Agreements with such Governmental Agencies governing the provisions in respect of which such loans are to be made, the amounts thereof and the repayment provisions in respect thereto; and

WHEREAS, the Authority anticipates entering into an Assistance Agreement for a loan from the Authority's Federally Assisted Clean Water Revolving Loan Program (Fund A) with the City of Louisa, subject to final determination of amount when the factors involving such financing have been determined; and

WHEREAS, the Authority will, in the near future, authorize and issue a series of Infrastructure Authority Revenue Bonds for the purpose of funding loans to various governmental agencies, such series of Bonds to be known as Kentucky Infrastructure Authority Revenue Bonds with the appropriate Series designation; and

WHEREAS, the Authority wishes to establish terms and conditions on said Fund A loans prior to the issuance of Authority Revenue Bonds and recognizes that additional planning and design of the financed projects are required.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY, ACTING BY AND THROUGH ITS BOARD OF DIRECTORS AS ITS DULY AUTHORIZED AND EMPOWERED GOVERNING BODY, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AND ORDER, AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1.</u> All statements of fact set forth in the preambles to this Resolution and Order are incorporated herein by reference, the same as if set forth verbatim. All such statements of fact are hereby declared to be true and accurate in all material respects.

<u>Section 2.</u> The Authority hereby authorizes the issuance of a conditional Federally Assisted Clean Water Revolving Fund loan for an amount up to \$3,359,566 including permanent financing for planning & design loan A17-023 in the amount of \$232,666 and

\$3,126,900 for construction, and capitalized interest during the construction period, to the City of Louisa for the Inflow & Infiltration Rehab project. Such amounts are subject to adjustment by further action of the Authority or may be adjusted by action of the Executive Director at the time of the issuance of bonds based on adjustment in project costs of not more than (10%) ten percent of the loan amount authorized by this resolution. Upon satisfaction of all conditions of the commitment, execution of an assistance agreement for this loan is authorized.

<u>Section 3.</u> Principal forgiveness of 50% of the assistance amount, not to exceed \$1,000,000 will be credited to the loan balance upon release of liens on all contracts and disbursement of the final draw request by KIA to the borrower. The unforgiven principal balance of \$2,359,566 shall be repaid.

Section 4. The unforgiven principal shall be repayable over 20 years at an interest rate of 0.50%. In addition to debt service, a 0.2% annual administration fee on the unpaid, unforgiven principal balance will be charged. From annual revenues, \$8,300 must be set aside in a borrower held replacement reserve each December 1 until the balance reaches \$166,000 and maintained for the life of the loan. IX. FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Financial information was obtained from the audited financial statements for the years ended June 30, 2016 through June 30, 2018. The City's Enterprise Funds account for water & sewer and swimming pool activities. The swimming pool operations are excluded from this analysis. The cash impact of GASB 68 - Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions and GASB 75 - Other Postemployment Benefit has been removed from the operating expenses. Percentage references in the History section below are based on whole dollar amounts and not the rounded amounts presented.

HISTORY

Combined water and sewer revenues went up 5.5% from \$2.62 million in 2016 to \$2.77 million in 2018 due to the annual CPI rate increases. Operating expenses increased less than 1% from \$1.83 million to \$1.84 million during the same period. The debt coverage ratio was 1.2, 1.2 and 1.4 for 2016, 2017, and 2018 respectively.

The balance sheet reflects a current ratio of 2.4, debt to equity ratio of 0.8, 67.5 days sales in accounts receivable, and 0.2 months of operating expenses in unrestricted cash.

PROJECTIONS

Projections are based on the following assumptions:

- 1) Water revenues will grow steadily each year at an estimated 2.7% for CPI adjustments.
- 2) Sewer revenues will increase 3.7% each year based on the historical average of CPI increases. This is projected at a higher rate than the water revenues due to the rate structure of the water customers including wholesale.
- 3) Wholesale water rates to Big Sandy Water District will remain at \$3.06 per 1,000 gallons. However, the Public Service Commission may set new rates as necessary.
- 4) Expenses will increase 2% each year for inflation.
- 5) Debt service coverage is 1.2 in 2022 when full year principal and interest repayments begin.

Based on the pro forma assumptions, the utility shows adequate cash flow to repay the KIA Fund A loan.

REPLACEMENT RESERVE

The replacement reserve will be 5% (\$166,000 total) of the final amount borrowed (prior to principal forgiveness, if any) to be funded annually (\$8,300 yearly) each December 1 for 20 years and maintained for the life of the loan.

A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR A FEDERALLY ASSISTED CLEAN WATER REVOLVING FUND LOAN (A19-012) FOR AN AMOUNT UP TO \$861,148 TO THE CITY OF TOMPKINSVILLE, MONROE COUNTY, KENTUCKY

WHEREAS, the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (the "Authority") has been duly created as a body corporate and politic constituting a public corporation and a governmental agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky pursuant to Chapter 224A of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Act, the Authority is duly and legally authorized to make loans to Governmental Agencies for the purpose of providing funds for the construction and acquisition of sanitary sewer facilities, water facilities or other types of infrastructure, and in that regard, to enter into Assistance Agreements with such Governmental Agencies governing the provisions in respect of which such loans are to be made, the amounts thereof and the repayment provisions in respect thereto; and

WHEREAS, the Authority anticipates entering into an Assistance Agreement for a loan from the Authority's Federally Assisted Clean Water Revolving Loan Program (Fund A) with the City of Tompkinsville, subject to final determination of amount when the factors involving such financing have been determined; and

WHEREAS, the Authority will, in the near future, authorize and issue a series of Infrastructure Authority Revenue Bonds for the purpose of funding loans to various governmental agencies, such series of Bonds to be known as Kentucky Infrastructure Authority Revenue Bonds with the appropriate Series designation; and

WHEREAS, the Authority wishes to establish terms and conditions on said Fund A loans prior to the issuance of Authority Revenue Bonds and recognizes that additional planning and design of the financed projects are required.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY, ACTING BY AND THROUGH ITS BOARD OF DIRECTORS AS ITS DULY AUTHORIZED AND EMPOWERED GOVERNING BODY, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AND ORDER, AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1.</u> All statements of fact set forth in the preambles to this Resolution and Order are incorporated herein by reference, the same as if set forth verbatim. All such statements of fact are hereby declared to be true and accurate in all material respects.

Section 2. The Authority hereby authorizes the issuance of a conditional Federally Assisted Clean Water Revolving Fund loan for an amount up to \$861,148 of project expense including capitalized interest for the construction period, to the City of

Tompkinsville for the WWTP Expansion & Sanitary Sewer Collection Improvements project. Such amounts are subject to adjustment by further action of the Authority or may be adjusted by action of the Executive Director at the time of the issuance of bonds based on adjustment in project costs of not more than (10%) ten percent of the loan amount authorized by this resolution. Upon satisfaction of all conditions of the commitment, execution of an assistance agreement for this loan is authorized.

<u>Section 3.</u> Principal forgiveness of 50% of the assistance amount, not to exceed \$430,574 will be credited to the loan balance upon release of liens on all contracts and disbursement of the final draw request by KIA to the borrower. The unforgiven principal balance of \$430,574 shall be repaid.

Section 4. The unforgiven principal shall be repayable over 30 years at an interest rate of 0.50%. In addition to debt service, a 0.2% annual administration fee on the unpaid, unforgiven principal balance will be charged. From annual revenues, \$2,200 must be set aside in a borrower held replacement reserve each December 1 until the balance reaches \$44,000 and maintained for the life of the loan. I. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The City of Tompkinsville ("the City") is requesting a Fund A loan in the amount of \$2,271,148. The purpose of the loan is to improve water quality through the elimination of sewer overflows during rain events.

The City has been experiencing overflows due to dilapidated sanitary sewer collectors and mains throughout the City. These damaged mains allow infiltration and inflow to enter the collection system during wet weather and thus cause health hazards to the public. The project will correct these issues by expanding the existing wastewater treatment plant ("WWTP") to a sequential batch reactor WWTP with a larger capacity. It will also rehabilitate the first 8,750 LF of old sewer main and install 11,600 LF of new force main with a lift station to eliminate the need for a local package treatment facility. The expansion and rehabilitation work is expected to reduce power consumption by 50%. The savings will provide the City with additional cash flow to fund future projects.

The City is a regional water provider serving approximately 1,200 retail customers and supplying wholesale water to the Monroe County Water District which is a Kentucky Public Service Commission ("PSC") regulated system. All wholesale water rate adjustments are subject to PSC approval.

IX. FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Financial information was obtained from the audited financial statements for the years ended June 30, 2016 through June 30, 2018. The non-cash impact of GASB 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions, has been removed from the operating expenses. GASB 75 – Other Postemployment Benefits is not applicable to the City's financial reporting. The South Central Bank note with an outstanding balance of \$82,234 was borrowed to fund a road project but reported under water operations by mistake. The debt service for this note has been excluded from our projections.

HISTORY

Combined water and sewer revenues went up 25.4% from \$1.46 million in 2016 to \$1.83 million in 2018 due to previously approved rate increases. Operating expenses increased 16.7% from \$1.16 million to \$1.35 million during the same period as a result of insurance costs associated with the new sludge facility and higher treatment costs in an exceptional wet year. The debt coverage ratio was 4.4, 4.6 and 3.2 for 2016, 2017, and 2018 respectively.

The balance sheet reflects a current ratio of 1.1, debt to equity ratio of 0.6, 13.7 days sales in accounts receivable, and 1.7 months of operating expenses in unrestricted cash.

PROJECTIONS

Projections are based on the following assumptions:

- 1) The City will receive other funding assistances including \$1,000,000 from CDBG, \$500,000 from ARC, and \$10,000 from the Monroe Board of Education to subsidize the total project costs.
- 2) Water revenues will go up 6.7% and sewer revenues up 9% in 2020 based on the approved rate increases effective February 1, 2019.
- 3) The project will add approximately 13 new customers to the system upon completion.
- 4) Expenses will increase 2% each year for inflation.
- 5) Debt service coverage is 4.5 in 2021 when principal and interest repayments begin.

Based on the pro forma assumptions, the utility shows adequate cash flow to repay the KIA Fund A loan.

REPLACEMENT RESERVE

The replacement reserve will be 5% (\$44,000 total) of the final amount borrowed (prior to principal forgiveness, if any) to be funded annually (\$2,200 yearly) each December 1 for 20 years and maintained for the life of the loan.

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A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR A FEDERALLY ASSISTED CLEAN WATER REVOLVING FUND A LOAN (A19-039) FOR AN AMOUNT UP TO \$5,193,000 TO THE PADUCAH McCRACKEN COUNTY JOINT SEWER AGENCY, McCRACKEN COUNTY, KENTUCKY

WHEREAS, the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (the "Authority") has been duly created as a body corporate and politic constituting a public corporation and a governmental agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky pursuant to Chapter 224A of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Act, the Authority is duly and legally authorized to make loans to Governmental Agencies for the purpose of providing funds for the construction and acquisition of sanitary sewer facilities, water facilities or other types of infrastructure, and in that regard, to enter into Assistance Agreements with such Governmental Agencies governing the provisions in respect of which such loans are to be made, the amounts thereof and the repayment provisions in respect thereto; and

WHEREAS, the Authority anticipates entering into an Assistance Agreement for a loan from the Authority's Federally Assisted Clean Water Revolving Loan Program (Fund A) with the Paducah McCracken County Joint Sewer Agency, subject to final determination of amount when the factors involving such financing have been determined; and

WHEREAS, the Authority will, in the near future, authorize and issue a series of Infrastructure Authority Revenue Bonds for the purpose of funding loans to various governmental agencies, such series of Bonds to be known as Kentucky Infrastructure Authority Revenue Bonds with the appropriate Series designation; and

WHEREAS, the Authority wishes to establish terms and conditions on said Fund A loans prior to the issuance of Authority Revenue Bonds and recognizes that additional planning and design of the financed projects are required.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY, ACTING BY AND THROUGH ITS BOARD OF DIRECTORS AS ITS DULY AUTHORIZED AND EMPOWERED GOVERNING BODY, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AND ORDER, AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1.</u> All statements of fact set forth in the preambles to this Resolution and Order are incorporated herein by reference, the same as if set forth verbatim. All such statements of fact are hereby declared to be true and accurate in all material respects.

<u>Section 2.</u> The Authority hereby authorizes the issuance of a conditional Federally Assisted Clean Water Revolving Fund A loan for an amount up to \$5,193,000 of project

expense including capitalized interest for the construction period, to the Paducah McCracken County Joint Sewer Agency for the Perkins/Crooked Creek Wet Weather Tank Project. Such amounts are subject to adjustment by further action of the Authority or may be adjusted by action of the Executive Director at the time of the issuance of bonds based on adjustment in project costs of not more than ten percent (10%) of the loan amount authorized by this resolution. Upon satisfaction of all conditions of the commitment, execution of an assistance agreement for this loan is authorized.

Section 3. The loan shall be repayable over 20 years at an interest rate of 2.0%. In addition to debt service, a 0.2% annual administration fee on the unpaid loan balance will be charged. There is no annual reserve requirement. These terms are subject to adjustment upon execution of the loan agreement, upon changes in the project conditions or determination that the project will require authority financing to be done on a taxable basis.

<u>Section 4.</u> This Resolution and Order shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption at a properly held meeting of the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority this 7th day of May, 2019.

The non-cash impact of GASB 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions, has been removed from fiscal 2016-2018 operating expenses and GASB 75, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions, has been removed from 2018 operating expenses. HISTORY

Revenues increased 23% from \$7.4 million in 2016 to \$9.1 million in 2018. The revenue increase was driven by rate increases for the utility in both 2016 and 2017. Expenses increased 3% from \$4.3 million in 2016 to \$4.5 million in 2018. Debt coverage was 2.2 in both 2016 and 2017 and 3.0 in 2018.

- 2) Expenses will increase 2% annually for inflation.
- 3) This analysis includes debt service for both A19-039 as well as A19-044 (\$482 thousand is the current combined estimate).
- 4) Debt service coverage is 1.6 in 2022 when full principal and interest repayments begin.

Based on the pro forma assumptions, the utility shows adequate cash flow to repay the KIA Fund A loan.

REPLACEMENT RESERVE

The Agency currently has designated reserves of \$3,000,000. The reserves are specifically for high dollar capital equipment purchases, for emergencies, or for rate stabilization in the event of a loss of a substantial revenue stream. No additional reserves will be required.

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A RESOLUTION AND ORDER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF A CONDITIONAL COMMITMENT FOR A FEDERALLY ASSISTED CLEAN WATER REVOLVING FUND A LOAN (A19-044) FOR AN AMOUNT UP TO \$2,476,652 TO THE PADUCAH McCRACKEN COUNTY JOINT SEWER AGENCY, McCRACKEN COUNTY, KENTUCKY

WHEREAS, the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (the "Authority") has been duly created as a body corporate and politic constituting a public corporation and a governmental agency of the Commonwealth of Kentucky pursuant to Chapter 224A of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Act, the Authority is duly and legally authorized to make loans to Governmental Agencies for the purpose of providing funds for the construction and acquisition of sanitary sewer facilities, water facilities or other types of infrastructure, and in that regard, to enter into Assistance Agreements with such Governmental Agencies governing the provisions in respect of which such loans are to be made, the amounts thereof and the repayment provisions in respect thereto; and

WHEREAS, the Authority anticipates entering into an Assistance Agreement for a loan from the Authority's Federally Assisted Clean Water Revolving Loan Program (Fund A) with the Paducah McCracken County Joint Sewer Agency, subject to final determination of amount when the factors involving such financing have been determined; and

WHEREAS, the Authority will, in the near future, authorize and issue a series of Infrastructure Authority Revenue Bonds for the purpose of funding loans to various governmental agencies, such series of Bonds to be known as Kentucky Infrastructure Authority Revenue Bonds with the appropriate Series designation; and

WHEREAS, the Authority wishes to establish terms and conditions on said Fund A loans prior to the issuance of Authority Revenue Bonds and recognizes that additional planning and design of the financed projects are required.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY, ACTING BY AND THROUGH ITS BOARD OF DIRECTORS AS ITS DULY AUTHORIZED AND EMPOWERED GOVERNING BODY, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AND ORDER, AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1.</u> All statements of fact set forth in the preambles to this Resolution and Order are incorporated herein by reference, the same as if set forth verbatim. All such statements of fact are hereby declared to be true and accurate in all material respects.

<u>Section 2.</u> The Authority hereby authorizes the issuance of a conditional Federally Assisted Clean Water Revolving Fund A loan for an amount up to \$2,476,652 of project

expense including capitalized interest for the construction period, to the Paducah McCracken County Joint Sewer Agency for the Massac Creek Phase III Project. Such amounts are subject to adjustment by further action of the Authority or may be adjusted by action of the Executive Director at the time of the issuance of bonds based on adjustment in project costs of not more than ten percent (10%) of the loan amount authorized by this resolution. Upon satisfaction of all conditions of the commitment, execution of an assistance agreement for this loan is authorized.

Section 3. The loan shall be repayable over 20 years at an interest rate of 2.0%. In addition to debt service, a 0.2% annual administration fee on the unpaid loan balance will be charged. There is no annual reserve requirement. Financial information was obtained from the audited financial statements for the years ended June 30, 2016 through June 30, 2018. The Revenues reflected in the Cash Flow reflect the City's Enterprise Funds, which account for the activities of water and sewer operations. The sewer component has been extracted from the financial statements for the purpose of this analysis. The non-cash impact of GASB 68 - Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions and GASB 75 - Other Postemployment Benefit is not applicable as the City does not report Pensions and OPEB liabilities.

HISTORY

Revenues increased 6.3% from \$789,906 in 2016 to \$839,877 in 2018 due to the rate increase effective July, 2017. Operating expenses went up 10.0% from \$538,824 to \$592,912 during the same period as a result of higher Repair and Maintenance costs. The debt coverage ratio was 4.3, 2.2 and 2.4 for 2016, 2017, and 2018 respectively.

The City recently approved a CPI rate adjustment that will begin in 2019.

The 2018 Balance Sheet reflects 52.5 days sales in accounts receivable, 6.8 months of operating expenses in unrestricted cash, a current ratio of 4.7, and a debt to equity ratio of 1.9.

PROJECTIONS

Projections are based on the following assumptions:

- The approved CPI rate adjustment will take effect on July 1 annually.
- 2) Water revenues will grow approximately 2% each year for the CPI adjustment.
- 3) Expenses will increase 2% annually for inflation.
- 4) Debt coverage ratio is 1.4 in 2022 when principal and interest repayments begin.
- 5) South Shore has an existing KIA loan F 18-019 that has not begun repayment. Debt payment and replacement reserve payments are projected to begin in December 2021 and have been included in the financial analysis.

Based on the pro forma assumptions, the utility shows adequate cash flow to repay the KIA Fund F loan.

REPLACEMENT RESERVE

The replacement reserve will be 5% (\$152,000 total) of the final amount borrowed (prior to principal forgiveness) to be funded annually (\$7,600 yearly) each December 1 for 20 years and maintained for the life of the loan. An additional \$2,200 has been included to represent the replacement reserve payments for loan F 18-019.

I. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The City of Russell ("the City") is requesting a planning and design loan in the amount of \$1,000,000 for the planning and design of an upgrade to the water treatment plant and system improvements necessary to provide reliability to the system.

The project will expand the capacity of the existing water treatment plant from 2 million gallons per day ("MGD") to 4 MGD. The construction involves installation of a new raw water intake and wet well structure with a rail system and replacement of a problematic existing 12" cast iron pipe with approximately 2,200 LF of 12" ductile iron pipe. In addition, there are two service stations in close proximity to the proposed water line replacement with buried gas tanks that will require ductile iron with nitrile gaskets for approximately 700 of the 2,200 LF new pipe. The completion of this project will improve the City's drinking water treatment process, ensure the treatment plant's ability to pump raw water from the Ohio River, and reduce water loss.

The City of Russell is a regional provider currently serving approximately 2,500 retail customers and providing wholesale water to the City of Flatwoods and the City of Raceland. The wholesale customers purchase about 64% of the water production.

IX. FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Financial information was obtained from the audited financial statements for the years ended June 30, 2016 through 2018. The non-cash impacts of GASB 68 - Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions and GASB 75 - Other Postemployment Benefit have been removed from operating expenses. Percentage references in the History section below are based on whole dollar amounts and not the rounded amounts presented.

HISTORY

Water revenues went up 1.9% from \$1.51 million in 2016 to \$1.54 million in 2018 due to the previously approved rate increase while operating expenses increased 2.8% for inflation from \$1.40 million to \$1.44 million during the same period. The debt coverage ratio was not applicable to the base years due to the absence of debt.

The balance sheet reflects a current ratio of 0.9, debt to equity ratio of 0.8, 33.7 days sales in accounts receivable, and 0.9 month of operating expenses in unrestricted cash.

PROJECTIONS

Projections are based on the following assumptions:

- 1) Total retail and wholesale revenues will grow 11% from the proposed rate increase effective June 1, 2019.
- 2) Beginning in 2020, the City will automatically adjust rates each year based on the Consumer Price Index.
- 3) Should the City decide to pursue a construction loan from KIA after the planning and design work is completed, additional \$875,000 revenues will be required to support a total loan amount of \$16.5 million. The City is exploring options for further rate increases or adjustments of usage blocks to maximize revenues for the anticipated debt service.
- 4) Operating expenses will increase 2% annually for inflation.
- 5) Debt service coverage is 1.4 in 2021 when principal and interest repayments begin.

Based on the pro forma assumptions, the utility shows adequate cash flow to repay the KIA Fund F loan.

REPLACEMENT RESERVE

Replacement reserve is not required for a planning and design loan.

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A RESOLUTION OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY AUTHORIZING AND APPROVING THE ISSUANCE OF OBLIGATIONS OF THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY TO REIMBURSE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES MADE BY GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES PURSUANT TO LOANS MADE BY THE KENTUCKY INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY TO SUCH GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (the "Authority") has heretofore approved the undertaking of the projects described in further detail in Exhibit A (collectively, the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Authority anticipates making loans to governmental agencies pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 224A of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (the "Act") for the Project and the governmental agencies may be expected to pay and/or incur costs with respect to the Project ("Prior Capital Expenditures") on or after the date of this resolution and prior to the issuance of the obligations (the "Obligations") which will finance the Project.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Directors hereby approves the use of the Obligations to finance the costs of the Project in the maximum principal amount set forth in <u>Exhibit A</u> plus costs of issuance related thereto and amounts required to fund a debt service reserve, if any, and declares its intent that any Prior Capital Expenditures made by the governmental agencies pursuant to loans made by the Authority will be made in anticipation of the issuance of such Obligations to reimburse said Prior Capital Expenditures. This declaration is made pursuant to Treas. Reg. §1.150-2.

Section 2. The Executive Director and Treasurer of the Authority are hereby authorized and directed to reimburse, not later than eighteen months after the later of (i) the date of the expenditure or (ii) the date the item was placed in service, but in any event not later than three years after the original expenditure, only those Prior Capital Expenditures made with respect to assets having a reasonably expected economic life of at least one year, and in addition, eligible preliminary expenditures paid and incurred prior to commencement of the Project.

Section 3. The Authority finds and determines that, consistent with the Authority's budgetary and financial circumstances, it does not have funds currently available and does not expect to have funds available in the future that may be allocated on a long-term basis, other than the proceeds of the Obligations, to finance the Prior Capital Expenditures.

Section 4. The Authority hereby directs the Executive Director, Secretary, and Treasurer to take the following action at the time the Prior Capital Expenditures are reimbursed from proceeds of the Obligations: (i) evidence the reimbursement on the books and records maintained with respect to the Obligations, and (ii) identify either the actual prior expenditure to be reimbursed or, in the case of reimbursement of a fund or account, the fund or account from which the expenditure was paid.

Section 5. The books, records and proceedings of the Authority with respect to this resolution shall be made reasonably available by the Authority for its inspection by the general public at the Authority's administrative office every business day during normal business hours commencing no later than 30 days after the passage of this resolution. Said books, record and proceedings of the Authority with respect to this resolution will continue to be reasonably available to the general public until the date of issuance of the Obligations.

Section 6. This Resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption. Passed and adopted this 7th day of May, 2019.
